We welcomed back Dr. Bikash Gauchan as our Medical Director for the second time, after investing three years in his education so he could lead our team with deeper clinical experience.

And we started building Nepal's first rural electronic medical record system—another long-term investment that will bear fruit for our patients and well beyond.



On average, each person in our 36,000-person catchment area visited a healthcare facility 1.7 times this quarter.

Possible's Co-Founder and Chief Programs Officer, Dr. Duncan Maru, was awarded the National Institutes of Health's Early Independence Award. This five-year award will help him build a research program focused on the design, implementation, and evaluation of rural health care delivery interventions.

MILESTONES

Our team identified six high-level milestones for Q1 at the start of FY 2015.

Complete costing model for scaling our programs across entire district.	Win and start utilizing National Institutes of Health research funding to advance our work.
Launch electronic medical record partnership through a site visit with ThoughtWorks.	Start Phase I of construction for hospital infrastructure master plan.
Execute our first NGO Board meeting with new Nepal Board members.	Find and onboard new Managing Director in Nepal.

- <u>ACCOMPLISHED INSIGHT</u>: We completed costing for scaling our model to the entire district, were awarded our first National Institutes of Health research award, built a new Board of Directors for our Nepal NGO, and launched our electronic medical record partnership with ThoughtWorks through a site visit.
- MISSED INSIGHT: We failed to break ground on Phase I of our infrastructure master plan due to delays in government funding reaching our bank account and contract structuring. Responsibilities for delays rests with both our team and the other parties. This has shifted to Q2 of Fiscal Year 2015.
- ➡ <u>SHIFTED INSIGHT</u>: We shifted our strategy away from finding a Managing Director in Nepal. Instead, we've identified a new structure where an existing team member will become our Governance and Partnerships Director based in Kathmandu, and we are hiring for an Operations Director and Finance Director within Nepal.




